EMERGENCY HALF PENNY CROWN A PERF W.A. JUNE 1911

Bromfield noted "In June 1911... there being no OS available of the ½d... small supplies of the ½d Crown A... were perforated W.A." Kellow notes that 240,000 ½d stamps were punctured OS and "these were dispatched to Perth in May 1911."

HEAD OFFICE CORRESPONDENCE

Not all official correspondence required the use of punctured official stamps. Public servants could write to their departmental Head Office using printing envelopes that did not require stamps to be affixed in order to be carried through the post to the GPO Perth. At the GPO such departmental mail was taxed, bundled, and delivered to a departmental messenger at the Poste Restante counter. Unpaid official mail in departmental envelopes was charged deficient postage but not fined. The deficient postage was marked on the top envelope of the bundle and postage due stamps affixed to indicate the amount accounted to the department.



Unlike the Lands and Surveys' returned to sender mail, which had to be retained, Head Office Correspondence envelopes were destroyed after opening. Those without postage due stamps had no philatelic value and few survive. Those with postage due stamps had philatelic value and some were taken to soak off the stamps. That is why so many of the currently available postage due stamps used in WA in this period have Poste Restante markings. That is also why so few Head Office Correspondence envelopes with postage due stamps survive.


SECTION C

COMMONWEALTH OS 1905 – 1913

MINT

The Government Printer, Melbourne produced Commonwealth OS perforated Western Australian stamps and included some remainders from earlier printings when issued in 1905. About 10,000,000 ½d Crown CA stamps were printed between first issue in 1885 and replacement with Crown A in 1911. How many Crown CA ½d OS is unknown.



The main official use for a halfpenny stamp was as a makeup for the 1½d overseas postcard and 2½d overseas letter rates.

When it was decided in 1898 to change to W Crown A watermark paper and introduce new designs for some values, there were sufficient quantities of the Crown CA 6d and 1/- that they were not released until 1906 and 1907 respectively.



"Departments are hereby notified that the Commonwealth postal authorities have approved of the acceptance of perforated (OS) Stamps in payment for "Collect" telegrams and deficient postage."




Kellow (p. 1/349) notes of the 5d "There were two despatches of OS stamps – 60,000 stamps in November 1905, 12,000 stamps in October 1910.... There must have been a further consignment, since OS stamps in pale greenish yellow also exist. OS stamps in olive-green are rare."

Kellow assumed the first despatch included some V Crown from reject sheets. An alternative explanation is that the 12,000 despatch comprised some current Crown A olive-green and some reject V Crown sheets. This is supported by the 1911 dates on V Crown OS 5d.

Higher value OS stamps are difficult to find on cover as they were used for 'collect' telegrams from officials, postage to be collected on unfranked departmental mail, and parcels – particularly from a State Battery to the Royal Mint.

Printings of the ½ d Crown A were made in February 1910 and June 1910 but 240,000 perforated OS were not despatched until May 1911 so necessitating the emergency WA ½d Crown A issue.
